Re: Proposed 2019 Trail Projects

In June of 2015 the Platte River Trails Trust (PRTT) signed an agreement with the City of Casper for #15 One Cent funding that stated that the City would allocate \$767,544 to the PRTT to fund "trail related projects". The PRTT's grant application for One Cent funding identified the Casper Mountain Road project as our primary goal over the four-year period. Over the past four years, in addition to writing 3 WYDOT TAP grants for this project, the PRTT also pursued an energetic fundraising campaign that resulted in \$160,000 in private funding for the project. The PRTT was unable to secure WYODT TAP funding for Phase III of this project and received pushback from property owners on Rotary Park Road which forced abandonment of Phase III of the project. The PRTT's fundraising efforts combined with the downturn in the local economy that produced a favorable bidding environment and lower project cost, and the abandonment of Phase III of the project, created a surplus of \$541, 280 of the \$764,544 of #15 funds originally allocated to our organization

Realizing that these funds were remaining, the PRTT embarked on a planning process, with assistance from City staff, to determine how to best utilize the funds to improve our community trail network. City staff provided the PRTT with resources that assessed the condition of trails community wide and the PRTT maintenance committee then visually analyzed certain trails that were red-flagged in the resources we received. At the same time, the PRTT Board and FRIENDS group took part in a survey to analyze and select potential trail projects based on the resources provided to us by the City and our own internal priorities.

This planning process has resulted in a proposed list of projects to undertake in 2019. We are pleased to present these projects to you for consideration. More than half of the funding will go towards major maintenance of the River Trail, the spine of our community trail system. The other projects are ones that will dramatically improve connectivity to create safer transitions

from neighborhoods to businesses, schools and community spaces. The Metropolitan Planning Office is currently involved with updating Casper's Long-Range Transportation Plan. The public survey portion of this planning process has shown that Casper citizens want safe and accessible alternate transportation routes AND more trails. The PRTT Board is dedicated to working with City staff to use funds allocated to us to best serve the citizens of Casper.

Subject: Supreme Court Agrees to Decide Fourth Amendment Vehicle Registration Case

HI all: This is my favorite kind of Supreme Court case...ones we can all relate to. Today I don't think any vehicles are registered in my name but like most Americans I drive two regularly. I doubt the SLLC will file a brief in this case—suppression of evidence and not money damages are the remedy. Long and short summaries below.

How often do you drive a vehicle not registered in your name? Every day? In <u>Kansas v. Glover</u> the Supreme Court will decide whether it is reasonable, under the Fourth Amendment, for an officer to suspect that the registered owner of a vehicle is the one driving it absent any information to the contrary.

Officer Mark Mehrer ran the license plate of a vehicle that was being driven lawfully. He discovered that the owner of the vehicle, Charles Glover, had a suspended license. He pulled the driver over and discovered he was in fact Charles Glover.

The Supreme Court has previously held that a police officer may pull over vehicles without a warrant when the officer has an "articulable and reasonable suspicion, based in fact, that the detained person is committing, has committed, or is about to commit a crime." Glover claimed the officer violated his Fourth Amendment rights because the officer lacked reasonable suspicion of illegal activity to pull over the car.

The Kansas Supreme Court agreed stating, "Deputy Mehrer had some suspicion of a specific crime—driving while revoked. But Deputy Mehrer, who had not observed a traffic violation, needed *reasonable* suspicion Glover was driving, not just *some* suspicion."

Kansas argued in favor of an "owner-is-the-driver presumption." The Kansas Supreme Court rejected it because it is based on the "stacking" of "unstated assumptions"—that the registered owner is likely the primary driver of the vehicle and owners will "likely disregard the suspension or revocation order and continue to drive." Assumption aren't enough under the Fourth Amendment. "An assumption has no basis in proof or demonstration, so it is only an inarticulate hunch or an unparticularized suspicion."

The Kansas Supreme Court also noted that the presumption rests in part on what the driver *does not* know—who is actually driving the car. "And in /evaluating whether the State has met its burden to prove the lawfulness of a search or seizure, courts cannot 'draw inferences from the lack of evidence in the record' because doing so may relieve the State of its burden and shift the burden to the defendant to establish why reasonable suspicion did not exist."

This is the first Fourth Amendment case the Supreme Court has agreed to decide next term and the third (out of ten) case from Kansas.

In Kansas v. Glover the Supreme Court will decide whether it is reasonable, under the Fourth Amendment, for an officer to suspect that the registered owner of a vehicle is the one driving it absent any information to the contrary. Officer Mark Mehrer ran the license plate of a vehicle that was being driven lawfully. He discovered that the owner of the vehicle, Charles Glover, had a suspended license. He pulled the driver over and discovered he was in fact Charles Glover. Glover claimed the officer violated his Fourth Amendment rights because the officer lacked reasonable suspicion of illegal activity to pull over the car. The Kansas Supreme Court agreed.
