- V. Teens collaborated across the street at Metro after participating at some level with us at DSS. I walked over there at its peak where there were 50 youth in and right next to Metro at a dark vacant area. Police were doing a great job interacting with the youth and making sure it was safe. My view of the youth was that these were the same youth (possibly didn't recognize a few) who were at DSS earlier as they were going back and forth from our activities and Metro and other unsupervised areas around DSS..

This scene gave me an idea to reach out to Lazarus Benson, who is a former BG Club member, Youth of the Year as well as a dynamic magician to help us. Two reasons - one he related to these kids and the second is his talent! He would be great walking into these groups and sharing his magician gift (cards tricks and more) with messages! Community Promotions Final Report

1. Mission

The mission of Special Olympics Wyoming is to provide year round participation in sports training and athletic competition in a variety of well-coached Olympic-Type sports for individuals with intellectual disabilities by providing athletes with continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness skills, express courage, experience joy and participate in the sharing of talents, skills and friendship with their families, friends, other Special Olympics athletes and the community.

2. Written account of event

The Summer Sports Classic is an annual two-day event that offers state-wide competition in golf, bocce, cycling, and softball. This year it was held on Friday, August 6, and Saturday, August 7 in Casper, Wyoming.

Participants competed in Unified Sports® Golf on Friday at the Casper Municipal Golf Course. Competition continued on Saturday with cycling at Edness Kimball Wilkins State Park, and softball teams, softball skills, and bocce at the North Casper Sports Complex.

Summer Sports Classic went off as expected and was very successful this year. We had a total of 9 programs from around the state participate in this year's event: Riverton, Thermopolis, Sublette County, Big Piney, Cheyenne, Gillette, Sheridan, Douglas, and Casper. All participants demonstrated spectacular sportsmanship throughout the weekend.

3. Financial Information

4. Program Significance

- a. The individuals who are the focus of our work:
- Special Olympics provides sports and athletic opportunities for people with intellectual disabilities (ID). Special Olympics Wyoming athletes are children and adults with ID.
- Special Olympics Wyoming athletes can participate in a variety of competitions at the local, area, state, and international levels. Special Olympics Wyoming hosts local and area competitions throughout the state each season, and hosts five state events each year.
- To be eligible to train and participate in Special Olympics, athletes must be at least 8 years old and identified by an agency or professional as having one of the following conditions: intellectual disability; a cognitive delay as determined by standardized measures such as intelligence quotient or other generally accepted measures; or a closely related developmental disability, i.e., functional limitations in both general learning and adaptive skills. No athlete is prohibited from participating based on their ability to pay.
- Participants who do not have an intellectual disability are called Unified Partners. Unified Sports increase inclusion and understanding within our communities.
 - b. The impact the program has on our target population:

- Summer Sports Classic provides athletes in the state of Wyoming opportunities to develop
 physical fitness skills, express courage, experience joy and participate in the sharing of talents,
 skills and friendship with their families, friends, other Special Olympics athletes and the
 community.
- Inclusion: Summer Sports Classic has a variety of team and individual sports. Within team sports, it has a variety of Unified Sports and traditional sports.
- Summer training: Summer Sports Classic is near the end of the summer, giving athletes opportunities to train throughout the season.

c. Trends:

• The most significant trend we've seen with our target population the past months is a return to play. Many of our athletes were unable to train and compete throughout the Covid-19 pandemic, but with a decrease in Covid-19 numbers this summer, we've seen athletes getting back into practices and competition.

5. Results

- Outcomes/outputs: the outcome of the event was a turnout of 9 programs throughout 2 days. Approximately 120 athletes and Unified Partners competed and were medaled appropriately.
- b. The method of measurement for results varies among sports, but each sport is scored according to that sport's rules.
- c. Performance results: for each sport, the participants are separated into divisions based on past scores, age, gender, etc. to make play fair for all and provide everyone a reasonable chance to win. Each participant is scored, then medaled appropriately within their division. Each division had participants medaled with gold, silver, bronze, fourth, etc.

6. Program results/impacts

- a. Quantity of service: Summer Sports Classic is a state-wide event lasting 2 days with full staffing and volunteers. We had approximately 120 athletes and Unified Partners participate in competition.
- b. Quality of service: Special Olympics Wyoming events provide athletes with high quality sports competition. We ensure our athletes experience all aspects of a competition. Many athletes, chaperones, and coaches expressed excitement at being back at a state-wide, inperson event with team sports again.
- c. Data: From last year to this year, the addition of team play for softball along with other lifted protocols grew the event from 50 athletes and Unified Partners to 120 athletes and Unified Partners.
- d. What could have worked better: There were minor details that could have been attended to that would have made the event run smoother. Having a volunteer meeting at the beginning of the day on Saturday would have helped the volunteers know when they were needed and

where. Sending out a consolidated version of softball team rules before the tournament would have helped everyone stay on the same page. Next year, we will attend to these details.

7. Attendance and Participation


