Rabies detected in bats within Natrona County

Casper-Natrona County Health Department has been notified that there has been an increase in the number of positive animal rabies reports this summer. While rabies is rare and typically numbers are low, Scott Schell with Casper Metro Animal Services has reported 3 positive tests in bats since June 7, 2018. This is a significant increase from past years.

These steps should be taken to minimize exposure to rabies:

- Vaccinate dogs, cats, ferrets, horses and other selected livestock for rabies and keep vaccinations current.
- Report any unusual animal behavior to Animal Control at Casper's non-emergency number (307-235-8278).
 - * Unusual animal behaviors include but are not limited to:
 - * bats active during daylight hours,
 - * excessive drooling or foaming at the mouth,
 - * aggressive behaviors,
- Avoid contact with stray and wild animals.
- Keep pets under supervision in a yard or on a leash to minimize contact with wild animals.
- Teach children to never approach unfamiliar dogs, cats or wildlife, even if they appear friendly.
- Treat animal bites with soap and water and contact a medical professional immediately.
- People waking to find a bat in their room or a child's room should contact a medical professional immediately as bats have such small teeth even unknown or minor contact with bats has led to rabies infection.

Dr. Karl Musgrave, state public health veterinarian with the Wyoming Department of Health, reminds people about the importance of animal vaccinations. "This can keep pets, horses and livestock from getting rabies, and help protect pet owners should pets be bitten by a rabid wild animal,". Musgrave said it is also important to report animal bites to local animal control officials and to follow recommended quarantine guidelines.

There is no known cure for rabies, however post exposure prophylaxis (vaccinations) are available. If you have been bitten by an animal you feel may have rabies, contact your healthcare provider. If you feel you have been exposed to rabies contact Leah Smith with the Casper-Natrona County Health Department at (307) 577-9745. For more information see https://www.cdc.gov/rabies/

GATEWAY WEST TRANSMISSION LINE PROJECT APPLICATION TO THE INDUSTRIAL SITING COUNCIL, DEQ/ISC 12-10

Dear Mayor Charlie Powell,

On July 30, 2018, Rocky Mountain Power (Applicant) filed an application for a Permit to construct and operate the Gateway West Transmission Line Project in Carbon County and Sweetwater County. The applicant proposes to construct and operate a total of 191.4 miles of 500-kilovolt (kV), 230-kV, and 345-kV alternating Current (AC) electric transmission lines and associated substation facilities as part of their Energy Vision 2020 plan. The 500-kV/345-kV portion of the project begins in Carbon County 20 miles northeast of the Town of Hanna, heading west passing just north of Hanna. It then continues along the I-80 corridor to the west from Sinclair to Point of Rocks, Wyoming into Sweetwater County and eventually terminates at the existing Jim Bridger Substation near Superior. The 230-kV portion of the project is located entirely in Carbon County and begins approximately 10 miles northwest of Medicine Bow and heads southwest terminating immediately southeast of the town of Hanna. The proposed project crosses 101.8 miles of private land, 74.3 miles of BLM-managed land, and 14.7 miles of State land, and 0.7 miles of water body crossings. Construction is anticipated to commence in Q2 2019 and be completed by Q3 2020. Construction manpower is anticipated to average 325 workers over the duration of the construction period from April 2019 through October 2020 and peak at 511 workers in October 2019. The hearing on this matter is anticipated on October 25, 2018 in Rawlins, Wyoming.

Part of the application process included a study of the features of local governments in a large geographic area that included your jurisdiction. No part of the application requirements were waived by the Director.

Reviewing the facts of the matter we have determined that your local government will be primarily affected by the proposed facility. Consequently you are eligible for impact assistance and continued participation as a party to the permit. Please contact me at 307-777-7369 or by email at Kimber.wichmann@wyo.gov for additional information about these options:

Becoming a party to the permit. If your local government wishes to become a party to the permit, it needs to notify us in writing before October 5, 2018; participate in the pre-hearing conference on October 3, 2018; and in the hearing on October 25, 2018. We anticipate the hearing to be two days. Both the pre-hearing and hearing will be in Rawlins, Wyoming.

<u>Limited appearance participation.</u> As an alternative to becoming a party, your jurisdiction may file a written statement with the Council at the time of the hearing.
